## **DATA COLLECTION**

---

### **Fieldwork**

- Philippines (July-Aug. 2014, Sept.-Dec. 2015)
  - Key Informant Interviews with village leaders in 75 randomly sampled villages within three conflict-affected provinces, Compostela Valley, Davao Oriental, and Agusan del Sur.
  - Semi-structured Elite Interviews with government officials, NGO representatives, military and police personnel, and activists in the Bangsamoro and CPP-NPA peace processes.
- Kosovo (June 2015)
  - Semi-Structured Interviews with former KLA members, govt. officials, and NGO representatives.

### **Datasets**

- Named Entities in the Social Sciences (NESS)-Political Organizations
  - A global dataset of nonstate political organizations extracted from Wikidata using weak supervision machine learning techniques.
- Terrorism in Armed Conflict (TAC)
  - Assigns specific attacks recorded in the Global Terrorism Database (GTD) to rebel organizations included in the Uppsala Conflict Data Program (UCDP)/Peace Research Institute Oslo (PRIO) Armed Conflict Data (ACD).
